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## The Increasing Social Role of Science

Today's public is more interested in solving social ills than in science and technology. At the same time, the increasing complexity and intrusiveness of science-based technology have increased the public's expectations of accountability and have sharpened its criticisms. Scientists now find it difficult to separate themselves from the institutional and political dimensions of their work.
